The committee was hopeful that by reducing the number of State Council meetings from four to two per year, (one of which would be convened in a regional area), this may have been an incentive for more members to put up their hands and nominate!

This, sadly, was not the case and, as has been pointed out previously, the present committee, like a good bottle of wine, are 'maturing fast'; and travelling to meetings from Shoalhaven, Port Macquarie, North Arm Cove (Port Stephens), Campbelltown and the Central Coast is a 'big ask' but with no fresh faces in the wings, it was their strong commitment to the FAW that compelled them to serve another year.

The newly-elected committee urge all members to consider nominating for a committee position from next year onwards, being mindful that the Fellowship of Australian Writers NSW Inc will celebrate its centenary in 2028! Lack of interest could spell the demise of this valuable organisation which, at its beginning, included such notable writers as Miles Franklin, Steele Rudd, and Dorothea MacKellar.

Each Branch sets it own ANNUAL FEE from which the \$40 (or \$20) affiliation fees are forwarded to FAW State Council for costs involved with printing and mailing *Writers Voice*, public liability insurance and administration.

Writing Fellows

FAW Writing Fellows are listed here: www.fawnsw.org.au/Writing_Fellows.pdf. The broad criteria for this class of membership, are that the applicant should have had a substantial body of work published and should normally have been a member of the FAW for at least two years. A committee of the State Council adjudicates on each application, which should be forwarded to the Registrar of Writing Fellows, FAW State Council, C/- Hon Sec. 22 Promontory Way, North Arm Cove NSW 2324. The application should:

a) be accompanied by a \$50.00 cheque, payable to 'Fellowship Aust. Writers'.

- b) indicate the Branch where the applicant is currently a member and the number of years of FAW membership.
- c) have attached a list of published, performed or broadcast works, with dates and details of publication. Also list any literary prizes awarded, although such works may be unpublished. Unpaid contributions to newspapers etc. and self-published works (unless widely sold and acclaimed) should not be included.

The one-time fee of \$50.00 will be used to cover costs of administration and cost of certificate. Excess funds will be used to further the work of the FAW. If the application is unsuccessful, the cheque will be returned, perhaps with a suggestion to re-submit an application when a greater body of work has been published.

Distinguished Service Award

This annual award recognises FAW members confidentially recommended by their Branch Committees and approved by the DSA Assessment Committee. DSA members will be honoured in the following way: a ceremony will be held at the Annual Presentation Luncheon and the successful candidates will be presented with certificates acknowledging their outstanding service. In addition, a permanent Honour Roll in *Writers' Voice* lists the names of recipients of the DSA.

Guidelines for assessing recommendations for Distinguished Service Awards:

- Recommendations must be as a result of a unanimous decision of a current Branch Committee.
- 2. Qualifications to include the following features:
 - (a) Length of service as a current financial member to be at least ten (10) years.
 - (b) Required to have a regular attendance record at Branch Meetings.
 - (c) Required to have participated in activities organised by the Branch Committee on a regular basis for at least eight years or to have served on the Branch Committee for at least eight years.
- 3. All recommendations to be submitted to the DSA Assessment Committee, C/-Hon Sec. 22 Promontory Way, North Arm Cove NSW 2324, by 30 June of each year.
- A committee comprising the State President, the Vice President, the Secretary and the Treasurer will assess recommendations. The DSA Committee's decision is final.

Members requiring their FREE ISBN (one number per publication) should, in the first instance, contact the FAW Secretary Maureen Kelly <nosecretary@fawnsw.org.au>. Your request will then be passed to Alan Russell (phone 02 9680 3374) <Alan_Russell@internode.on.net> for action.

Critical reading with general criticism, editing including interpolation of articles, short stories and novels. A fee applies of \$50 (\$60 non-members) for a sample assessment of 2 chapters and \$25 (\$30 non-members) for 1 or 2 poems of no more than 60 lines each. A detailed quote for the critical assessment of the remaining work will be supplied should the author require further editorial or constructive advice. For manuscripts, please include a synopsis and approximate word count and a stamped self-addressed envelope for return of all the assessments. From the President


H I to all Members. Well time is flying by and we need to do as much as we can to enjoy the life.

Some writing advice from Chuck Palahniuk: for the next half year; you may not use "thought" verbs. These include: Thinks, Knows, Understands, Realises, Believes, Wants, Remembers, Imagines, Desires, etc. You can't write: "Kenny wondered if Monica didn't like him going out at night..."

Instead, you'll have to un-pack that to something like: "The mornings after Kenny had stayed out, beyond the last bus, until he'd had to bum a ride or pay for a cab and got home to find Monica faking sleep, faking because she never slept that quiet, those mornings, she'd only put her own cup of coffee in the microwave. Never his."

This is a great way to "Show" rather than "Tell", the subject of our workshop in March. A perennial favourite, it was followed by 'Scriptwriting' in late May. Another variation to our regular program was an excursion to the Eurobodalla Botanic Gardens for some descriptive writing. We spread out to closely observe something that grabbed our attention and chose one of the given exercises. Reporting back it was a surprise how many different approaches had been used. This is always an interesting feature of sharing our writing.

and all the hard ground-work for our next anthology.

A highlight of the last few months was a visit by Maureen Kelly, FAW State Secretary and another member of the North Arm Cove branch, Elizabeth Deane, to present Distinguished Service Awards to the members who were unable to make the trip to Sydney last December: Eileen Backhus, Margaret Barlow, Margaret Ekin and Mavis Hayes [see photo p5]. The previous evening the committee took our guests to dinner at the Moruya Golf Club and spent a wonderful evening sharing stories over glasses of wine.

Just before Easter the organiser of a Shire-wide 'Writers Roadshow', Sue Maxworthy, principal of Bateman's Bay Primary, contacted us to see if any of our members would like to run two full-day workshops with 20 talented writer students, from 13 schools, in Years 5–8: one in Bateman's Bay and the other in Bodalla. Two of our members, Cassy Webb and Stafford Ray, jumped at the chance to design a day's writing activities for a bunch of eager students.

Our night group, set up and run by Louise Falcioni and Cat Sheely, and meeting the first Tuesday of every month, is going from strength to strength. Now one year old, it offers lively critiquing of stories posted online a few days earlier. Members also attend the local markets with their books for sale.

Eight of our past and present members have had their stories published in a new anthology being launched on May 24 at Hooked on Books in Bateman's Bay. Called *Memoirs from the Bay*, it is the result of the Perfex competition in

Valerie Parv receives ASA Medal

Internationally acclaimed romance writer Valerie Parv—a member of Lambing Flat FAW—has been awarded the 2014 ASA Medal by the Australian Society of Authors.

Established in 2003, the ASA Medal is awarded biennially in recognition of an outstanding contribution to the Australian writing community.

Valerie is an international bestselling author of romance fiction and has sold more than twentynine million copies of her books worldwide. Valerie is the first Australian writer to receive a Pioneer Award from RT Book Reviews, New York, for her contributions to the field of romance writing. She also proudly serves as an Australia Day Ambassador. Her practical guide to the genre, *The Art of Romance Writing* (Allen & Unwin 1993, 2004) was voted the most useful book on romance writing in a poll of members of Romance Writers of Australia.

Valerie held Australia's first romance writing workshop in 1988, which led to the founding of Romance Writers of Australia, and she has been a member ever since. In 1999 Romance Writers of Australia established the Valerie Parv Award in her honour. Valerie mentors the winner during the year of their award, and nearly all past winners have been successfully published.

The other recipient of the 2014 ASA Medal—Sydney resident Nadia Wheatley—writes for both adults and young people. Nadia's award-

winning books cover the genres of fiction, history, biography and picture books, and reflect her commitment to social justice. Nadia's first book, *Five Times Dizzy*, is often described as the first multicultural children's book in this country.



Sharyn's funeral was at Ourimbah on 1 May 2014, with 300 people from the entertainment industry in attendance, officiated by Father Chris Riley. *Following are extracts from the Eulogy given by Lindsay...*

"Sharyn O'Brien, Ahern, Crystal, Killens, Kennedy. Her name gives a hint to an extraordinary life lived. Each of those names represent a significant time in her life. A life laid bare in print, for all the world to see which in no small part, showed the sheer guts and determination of this amazing woman.

Telling of those desperate times of her life has been her triumph because unsuspectingly, Sharyn gave a voice to



To Sharyn, family was everything. She was so proud of her boys, Jason and Stephen, who were at times, her inspiration to not give in but to fight and stay focused to achieve a better life for the three of them. And then Sharyn met Allan, the love of her life. With Allan's twins, the extended family now includes 10 grandchildren and one great grandchild, who she all loved dearly.

And then there is her other family. Her American sisters: Debra, Donna, Sandra and her brother Thaddeus Jr who, when she found them, welcomed her with open arms and love and acceptance. She found her roots—her heritage—which as she said, completed the circle. She finally knew who she was.

Sharyn was an accomplished singer and entertainer and also worked as a publicist and an entertainment booking agent and manager.

She was funny, warm and generous; she was so sentimental and loving and giving and tenacious and determined and could be feisty and obstinate. But most of all, Sharyn was a true and loyal friend, a caring friend."




An excellent job done by Springwood Printing Co, it is a delight for readers with Prose and Poetry. Many members have contributed to this publication and I would love to mention them all, however there is space only to mention a few.

There are a number of very interesting photos and illustrations in this book and they highlight many of the works very well.

'To Venice with love' by John Smith is a very nice read. Rosemary Baldry delighted me with her story of 'Don't cry little rabbit'. 'The Bunyip' by Mat Elsdon is fun and very clever. The book is delightfully illustrated by Wendy Zirngast.


For some members, writing for younger people was a challenging situation.

'purple. emerald. gold.'
Short stories by Victoria Norton

The March edition of Writers Voice featured a short story 'Beatrice Fed the Ducks on Monday' on the cover. That story is one from author Victoria Norton's book of short stories, purple. emerald. gold. Here Jan Mitchell reviews the book...

Victoria Norton loves to write and she writes with imagination and flair. Her first published book of short stories, poems and memories is a delight to be savoured. The title, 'purple, emerald, gold' comes from the initial story, 'The Headland':

The intricate music of my flute solo spins out melodic sound lines, alive with tone and texture, and it becomes a physical form, a wave of sound, wrapping around me, merging, melding, mending me to this place. Bright and rich, my sound colours the atmosphere. Purple. Emerald. Gold. It is the Aurora Australis. I am the concert flutist. I am the conductor. I am the audience. The applause is mine.

Not only does this extract give us the origin of her title, it perfectly demonstrates how Victoria weaves the magic of imagery into her words. Even snippets of memories are told in a way that allows the words to sparkle and shift from the ordinary.

Her roles as daughter, sister, wife and mother coupled with her

nursing career have provided Victoria with a plethora of experiences and observations around which to weave her stories. 'Beatrice Fed the Ducks...' is a poignant story of aging and memory failure, which is sure to pierce even the hardest heart. 'White Shoes' and 'A Weather Eye' bring memories of fellow nurses who influenced Victoria's attitudes to work and life, while 'Code of Denial' draws on her knowledge of drugs and their dangers.

The stories bring Victoria's insights into human nature into our consciousness, asking us to think about the rights and wrongs of human behaviour. In some, the character gets away with her bad behaviour ('The Gift Register'). In others ('It Should Have Been Me'), comeuppance is a just reward. 'Blue' is a wonderfully crafted story where all three characters receive justice, or at least we expect that in the end, Mary will as well.

The human need for love, comfort and trust are themes throughout this book, never more aptly expressed than in 'The Story of a Little Blue Bear', while the ability to enjoy the simple pleasure of life is demonstrated in 'The Best Kind of Christmas'.

Characters are revealed seemingly with ease and the experiences they have are realistic, whether they are from life or Victoria's wonderful imagination.

The book contains fifteen fictional short stories, two very short one act plays, several memories, an essay and a smattering of short poems.

These guidelines are flexible. A combination of several of the above can be offered if the items are only short. Attach a blank sheet behind the manuscript for comments, remembering that five or six people need to be included. Include a self-addressed envelope of suitable size and postage value for the workshopped items to be returned.

Apart from your comments, your contribution to the scheme is no more than the postage required to send the parcel of manuscripts on to the next person on the list—a small price to pay for the value that can be derived from others' constructive remarks on your work.
